

Professor Gabriel Eckstein joined the law faculty at Texas Wesleyan University School of Law in 2010. Previously, he was a law professor at Texas Tech University School of Law where he held the George W. McCleskey Chair in Water Law and directed the Texas Tech Center for Water Law & Policy. Before entering academia, Eckstein served as senior counsel for CropLife America, an agrichemical trade association, working on environmental regulation and legislative matters. And before that, he worked a litigator in private practice on environmental, toxic tort and asbestos cases.

Eckstein's research focuses on water and environmental issues, at both the national and international levels, as well as the interrelationship of law and science. His recent publications have addresses climate change and global water resources and the international law of transboundary aquifers. Eckstein also serves as an expert advisor and consultant on US and international environmental and water law issues and has worked with the United Nations, US Agency for International Development, World Commission on Dams, Organization of American States, International Association of Hydrogeologists, and various local water entities in the United States. Eckstein also directs the Internet-based International Water Law Project and is currently on the executive board of the International Water Resources Association.

Eckstein holds J.D. and LL.M. degrees from American University where he served as recent developments editor of the *American University International Law Review*. He also earned an M.S. in International Affairs from Florida State University and a B.A. in Geology from Kent State University. He is admitted to the bars of New York, West Virginia and the District of Columbia.
