Jonathan Lewis is an attorney and climate specialist with the Clean Air Task Force, a nonprofit organization dedicated to reducing atmospheric pollution through research, advocacy, and private sector collaboration. He works with companies, governments, and citizen groups on state, national, and international initiatives to address climate change. Jonathan coordinates the Clean Air Task Force's effort to facilitate transnational partnerships between cutting-edge companies and institutions that have the potential to rapidly deploy low- and zero-carbon energy technologies. He co-founded the Asia Clean Energy Innovation Initiative and the Asia Clean Coal Initiative, and has organized executive roundtables in China and the United States on topics including carbon capture and storage, underground coal gasification, and concentrated solar thermal technology.

Jonathan also directs CATF's effort to ensure that policies which promote biofuels and biomass-based power deliver climate benefits. Jonathan has helped regional environmental organizations develop state policies for reducing greenhouse gas emissions, and represented several of those organizations in lawsuits challenging federal policies that would have undermined the United States' Clean Air Act. Before joining the Clean Air Task Force in 2001, he worked with the Ocean Law Project, The Nature Conservancy, and the City of Boston Environment Department's Conservation Commission.
